PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2019

We've just had the branch's premier lecture—the Hudson Lecture—presented at Victoria University in August. Professor Tony Ward's talk on "Theoretical illiteracy and therapeutic dead ends: lessons from forensic and correctional practice" was well attended and fascinating. If you've missed it, you can still see the talk on our new and very flash website (https://rsnzwellington.live.prefer.co.nz/). There are other lectures on our website too, including the 2018 Hudson Lecture by Professor Miriam Meyerhoff.

We're using the new website more and more. There are previous talks and newsletters there. But, perhaps more importantly, now you can use this site to join the society and annually pay your fees. We are actively encouraging people to use this site as it is a great way for us to record membership lists and member details.

Please do sign up for the Branch in 2020 using the website! The website also has had a series of blogs including a recent article on prime numbers by David Lillis.

The Committee have been discussing ideas for increasing the relevance and impact of the branch to the local science community. One suggestion has been for the Wellington Branch to develop position statements on key issues affecting science and communities in the Wellington region. These issues might include climate change, bottled water, or vaccination. We will trial this approach in 2020. We suggest that potential topics could be chosen after gathering suggestions and discussion at

the AGM. So please come along and bring your suggestions for issues to discuss. Perhaps we could consider two topics for 2020. Once the topics have been decided, we could then bring in speakers or a panel for a public discussion or seminar, with a follow-up of a subcommittee of the branch to develop a short evidence-based document and position (e.g. two pages). That document and position could be publicized with letters-to-the-editor in newspapers etc. We think this could be a good idea and use of the Branch, but need your input and enthusiasm too.

In 2019 the Branch continued its long support of the NIWA Wellington Science & Technology Fair, which was again a successful event and useful contribution to the Wellington science community. I'd like to acknowledge the major roles that committee members Nicole Stanton and Chrissy Boulton have played in the organisation and running of the fair. Nicole and Chrissy have joined a long-serving and outstanding committee that have provided a major service to science in Wellington. And, while speaking about committees, I'd like to thank the entire membership of the Wellington Branch of the Royal Society. We owe a debt to our council members Frank Andrews, Chrissy Boulton, Evan Brenton-Rule, Lucy Forde, Brian Jones, Nicole Stanton and David Lillis.

A final note of sadness, in acknowledging the passing of Dr. Wyn Beasley in July 2019. Wyn was an enthusiastic and very supportive member of the council at a time when the society was struggling to get people to commit. He gave a number of very well attended talks and arranged for us to hold an AGM at the Wellington Club,

of which he was a long-standing member. He was especially interested in the history of medicine and particularly the relationship between Banks, Cook and John Hunter the surgeon, being the author of the book "Fellowship of the three" which was the basis of a talk to the Society. Wyn was, in every sense of the term, "a scholar and a gentleman". He will be greatly missed.

1. GENERAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2. PARTICULAR ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Investments

Investments are valued at the lower of cost or net realisable value.

Incomes and expenses

Incomes are recognised upon receipt of monies. Expenses are recognised upon transferred payment.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

These financial statements have been prepared inclusive of GST. The Royal Society of New Zealand Wellington Branch Inc. is not registered for GST.

Differential Reporting

The entity is a qualifying entity of differential reporting by virtue of the fact that is not large and is not publicly accountable. All available exemptions have been applied with the exception of FRS-19, "Goods and Services Tax".

Income Taxation

The entity is an incorporated Society and Charitable Trust that qualified for income tax deduction as a non-profit organisation. If net surplus is lower than \$1,000, an income tax return is not required by the IRD

Membership Subscriptions and Donations

The RSNZ Wellington Branch is a membership charitable trust. The subscriptions and donations are non-taxable income.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 2018

The 2018 Annual General Meeting was held at the Thistle Inn, Thorndon on 11 October 2018 at 6pm. The AGM was followed by a speaker, Dr Paul Young MBChB, BSc (Hons), FCICM. Paul is an Intensive Care Specialist and the Medical Director of the Wakefield Hospital ICU and head of the Intensive Care Research Unit at Wellington Hospital.

HUDSON LECTURE 2019

Theoretical Illiteracy and Therapeutic Dead ends: Lessons from Forensic and Correctional Practice

Wednesday 14th August 2019

Professor Tony Ward DipClinPsyc, PhD, FRSNZ Victoria University of Wellington

Professor Tony Ward of Victoria University's School of Psychology delivered the 2019 Hudson Lecture on Wednesday 14 August. Professor Ward spoke about the classification and explanation of crime in research and practice. Research on crime and risk factors that lead to crime provides clinicians with useful information on offending groups. He said that dynamic risk factors and offence types are underpinning constructs that support current forensic practice and rehabilitation policy. However, Professor Ward believes that reliance on these constructs is leading to theoretical dead ends, fragmented practice and disappointing rehabilitation outcomes. Professor Ward discussed new ways of formulating dynamic risk factors and classifying crime. He discussed how these theoretical innovations can lead to superior

theory and more targeted interventions. The lecture was held at Victoria University and approximately sixty people attended.

Other Branch Lectures

Wednesday 10 April Associate Professor Richard Arnold (Programme Director - Data Science at the School of Mathematics and Statistics, Victoria University of Wellington)

presented the first Wellington Branch Lecture for 2019, entitled 'Statistics isn't the Problem.'

Professor Arnold described how statistics contributes to knowledge and the establishment of evidence rather than anecdote. He gave a brief summary of his own academic career and presented examples of his work as an applied statistician in health, seismology and linguistics. He also discussed the new discipline of Data Science.

On Wednesday 3rd July Dr Annette Koo from the Measurement Standards Laboratory of New Zealand (MSL) spoke on "Cheese, platinum and fundamental constants - what is the revision of the SI all about?

Worldwide agreement on units of measurement has brought us freedom to trade and innovate, as well as supported improved wellbeing and trust. Dr. Koo's talk outlined why are we changing the system now and what the revision of the International System of Units promises for the future. Dr. Koo discussed the redefinition of the Kelvin away from the triple of point of water, including the measurements contributing to the final value of Boltzmann's constant and the ongoing implementation of the temperature scale.

Café Scientifique Lower Hutt

The Branch continued to support Café Scientifique in Lower Hutt during 2018 before it went into recess through 2019. In 2019 a separate Café Scientifique associated with Victoria University began and a donation was given to the organisers by the Branch.

- November 2018: Bill Trompetter on "Indoor air quality: What Tiny Particles Are In The Air We Breathe In?"
